

The context

The *Croydon Schools and the Black Child* conference was held in 2003. Over 300 parents, teachers and other stakeholders attended. Six years on, we know that education continues to be the key priority for BME communities. We now want to examine progress since then, and areas where further improvements are needed.

This year's conference comes at a crucial time. Nationally, the debate about building schools of the future is underway. This discussion is replicated locally, coupled with the development of a 30-year vision for the borough. It is therefore a crucial time for all stakeholders to come together to reflect on the future.

The conference will give voice to parents and place the needs of black and minority ethnic children on the agenda in Croydon, encouraging joined-up thinking and **action** in raising their attainment. We hope that it will address gaps in services by encouraging networking, partnerships and collaboration between schools, the community, voluntary sectors providers and the statutory sector.

Croydon BME Forum is the umbrella body for Croydon's black and minority voluntary and community sector organisations, building capacity, involving people and promoting community cohesion.
